Greetings,

You are hereby authorized and requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Billerica qualified by law to vote in Elections and Town Affairs, to meet at the Billerica Memorial High School Auditorium located at 35 River Street, Billerica, MA on Tuesday, October 6, 2020 at 7:00 PM and subsequent Thursdays and Tuesdays until all of the business in the Warrant shall have been acted upon, then and there to vote on the following articles:

ARTICLE 1 - TO APPOINT ONE MEMBER TO THE BOWERS FUND COMMITTEE

To see if the Town will vote to appoint one (1) member to the Bowers Fund Committee for a term of five (5) years; or act in relation thereto.

Finance Committee has not made final recommendation.

Article 1 Explanation: The Bowers Fund Committee was established in the late 1800's when the Bower sisters left their entire estate to the Town of Billerica, approximately \$11,000, with the express intent of assisting the poor of Billerica. The current expendable balance in the fund is \$9,535 and the principal balance is \$132,053. Town Meeting appoints members to the Bowers Fund Committee. Committee member Marie O'Rourke's term is expiring and she is requesting that she be reappointed.

MOTION:

That the Town appropriates \$10,000,000 to pay costs of designing, constructing, remodeling and equipping the Peggy Hannon-Rizza Multi-Generational Park and Recreational Complex, which project shall include, among other elements, turf fields, softball fields, pavilion, parking, community space, restrooms and concessions, including the payment of all costs incidental and related thereto, and that to meet this appropriation, the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, is authorized to borrow said amount under and pursuant to M.G.L. c. 44, \$7(1), M.G.L. c. 44B (the Community Preservation Act), or any other enabling authority, and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor. Any premium received upon the sale of any bonds or notes approved by this vote, less any such premium applied to the payment of the costs of issuance of such bonds or notes, may be applied to the payment of costs approved by this vote in accordance with M.G.L. c. 44, \$20, thereby reducing the amount authorized to be borrowed to pay such costs by a like amount.

ARTICLE 14 - TO FUND THE COATING OF FOUR (4) SECONDARY CLARIFIERS AT THE WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT

To see if the Town will vote to transfer and appropriate a sum of \$350,000 from the Plant Expansion Fund to repair and coat the four (4) secondary clarifiers at the Wastewater Treatment Plant; or act in relation thereto.

Finance Committee has not yet made final recommendation.

Article 14 Explanation: The corrosion of the metal walls of the four (4) secondary clarifiers will require sand blasting to the bare metal, metal prep of corroded areas and applying primer then coating with specialty paint. Each clarifier holds 260,000 gallons of wastewater. The balance of this fund as of June 30, 2020 is \$1,889,591.

ARTICLE 15 - TO FUND HYDRANTS AND VALVE REPLACEMENTS

To see if the Town will vote to transfer and appropriate a sum of \$100,000 from the Water Conservation Fund for the replacements of hydrants and valves in the Water Distribution System; or act in relation thereto.

Finance Committee has not yet made final recommendation.

<u>Article 15 Explanation</u>: This article will continue the Hydrants and Valve Replacement Program the Town had started five (5) years ago. This funding will fund the purchase of approximately fifty (50) hydrants and valves. The work to replace these will be done using Town staff. Over the last five years we have replaced 556 hydrants.

ARTICLE 16 - TO FUND THE PURCHASE OF A NEW FIRE TRUCK

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer from available funds, or borrow the sum of \$650,000 to fund the purchase of a rescue/pumper truck for the Billerica Fire Department; or act in relation thereto.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from General Fund Free Cash the sum of \$6,000,000 to the Debt Stabilization Fund; or act in relation thereto.

Finance Committee has not yet made final recommendation.

<u>Article 18 Explanation</u>: The Town, through the Board of Selectmen, has established a Debt Stabilization Policy that maintains the same level of appropriation from the tax levy year to year - \$9.066 million. This is accomplished in the following two ways:

- Transferring a minimum amount of free cash and or retained earnings annually in the amount of \$1.8 million to the Debt Stabilization Fund.
- To appropriate the difference of any year that is lower than \$9.066 million to Debt Stabilization.
- If the annual appropriation exceeds \$9.066 Million to transfer the amount that it exceeds the desired level of appropriation (\$9.066) from the Debt Stabilization Fund into the Debt Service Appropriation. To ensure that the tax impact of the debt service on the new high school and the Parker Elementary does not exceed \$200 on the median Household.

The balance in the Debt Stabilization Account is used to minimize the tax levy impact that would otherwise be realized with addition of sewer debt and school capital debt. At the time the warrant was printed, the Department of Revenue had not yet certified Free Cash and Enterprise Water and Sewer Retained Earnings Funds as of June 30, 2020. The Debt Stabilization Fund balance as of June 30, 2020 is \$20,249,674.

ARTICLE 19 - TO VOTE A SUM OF MONEY TO THE STABILIZATION FUND

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from General Fund Free Cash the sum of \$6,000,000 to the Stabilization Fund; or act in relation thereto.

At the time this warrant was printed, the Department of Revenue had not yet certified Free Cash as of July 1, 2020.

ARTICLE 20 - TO VOTE A SUM OF MONEY TO THE LAND BANK ACCOUNT

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase a parcel of land known as the MBTA Right of Way on Corcoran Road and to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer from available funds, or borrow the sum of \$13,500 to fund this purchase; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 24 - TO FUND THE DESIGN OF SEWER FORCE MAIN REHABILITATION AND/OR REPLACEMENTS

To see if the Town will vote to transfer and appropriate a sum of \$500,000 from the Plant Expansion Fund for the design to rehabilitate and/or replace 15,000 LF of sewer force main that transports sewer from the Brown Street Sewer Pump Station to the Rogers Street Sewer Pump Station; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to acquire a license agreement/easement from the MBTA for construction and future maintenance of force main; or act in relation thereto.

Finance Committee has not yet made final recommendation.

Article 24 Explanation: The Town's Comprehensive Study identified this 15,000 LF between the Brown Street Sewer Pump Station and the Rogers Street Sewer Pump Station force main as problematic and in need of rehabilitation or replacement. The pipe was installed in 1975 and has reached its life expectancy. The force main transports about 1.5 million gallons per day. In the Spring of 2020, the force main experienced a break that contaminated wetland adjacent to the main location and was on MBTA property. The cost of repair and remediation was about \$60,000.

ARTICLE 25 - TO FUND WASTEWATER SYSTEM EXPANSION, AREA 4 (CONTRACT 37)
